A Letter to the Honorable President of the United States, Donald J. Trump

From the Council of Bishops of The United Methodist Church

Dear President Trump:

We greet you in the mighty name of Jesus Christ, whom we United Methodists claim as Lord and Savior.

We pray for you and your Administration. May God grant you wisdom and sustaining grace as you serve as President of the United States, and as a world leader.

Our letter comes to you at this critical time because of your Administration's Executive Order to suspend all U.S. foreign assistance programs and subsequent Work Stop Order issued by the Department of State. We present our concern to you after much prayer and in response to our Christian faith in the Wesleyan Tradition. As religious leaders of The United Methodist Church, we believe that we bishops are called to be pastors and prophets in every generation. Furthermore, our United Methodist Church understands its role in political matters in the manner that is defined by our Social Principles.

I feel it is important for all of us to understand the perspective of our denomination as well.

For this reason, I share the following letter from the President of our United Methodist College of Bishops dated February 3, 2025 and addressed to President Donald J. Trump. Clearly what is most profoundly conveyed is the conviction of faith that we cannot, in good faith, disengage ourselves from being concerned with the conditions of the larger global community. Here below is our United Methodist Council of Bishop's letter to President Trump.

"Our involvement in political systems is rooted in the Gospel imperative to love our neighbors, to do justice, and to care for the vulnerable. As United Methodists, we acknowledge that love requires responsible political action and engagement aimed at the betterment of society and the promotion of the common good. We acknowledge that such political engagement demands humility and mindfulness of our own complicity in perpetuating injustice. It also necessitates compassion, prayer, and a willingness to discern God's guidance.

We further believe that God calls all members of the human family to recognize and protect the dignity and worth of all people and to work for the well-being of all God's creation. "

(The Social Principles of The United Methodist Church)

Your Administration's recent Executive Order to suspend all U.S. foreign assistance programs for 90 days raises profound concerns for The United Methodist Church. As a world-wide Church we engage with congregations and communities throughout the world. We bear a longstanding commitment to serving the vulnerable and promoting global justice. In seeking to understand your perspective on this particular matter we have learned that your Administration is concerned that U.S. foreign aid may not align with American interests. We would respectfully ask that you consider the moral imperative to assist those in need and the significant contributions programs supported by U.S. foreign aid make to humanitarian relief and peace.

The United Methodist Church has an agency, the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR), that provides

relief and assistance in response to natural and human-made disasters in addition to supporting programs in the areas of migration, health, food security and environmental sustainability. Through this global response effort that today spans 85 years of service, we have often partnered with U.S. relief offices and efforts and learned how U.S. aid fosters global stability, alleviates suffering, and promotes the well-being of communities in need. We also know that today U.S. Foreign Aid comprises only about 1% of the federal budget. Yet, this 1% plays a crucial role in reflecting the U.S. values of compassion and service, values we United Methodists are deeply committed to as well.

As Christians we believe that we are called to care for our neighbors, regardless of race, religion, status or nationality. These are not uniquely Christian values. We share these values and teachings with persons of Jewish, and Muslim faith as well as persons of other faiths. Coming to the aid of the less fortunate and advocating for justice are shared values among people of faith, but we also believe that they are values upon which the U.S. was founded.

Recently we have come to know that a justification framework being implemented by your Administration to determine the distribution of U.S. foreign assistance is the requirement that every dollar of U.S. foreign assistance be evaluated on its impact on U.S. national security, strength, and prosperity. We lament that this justification framework overlooks aid's spiritual and ethical dimensions. Faith communities understand that humanitarian assistance is a matter of security, but it is also an expression of love and compassion. Inaction can create vacuums for adversarial influences to thrive, undermining both the stability and the safety of vulnerable populations.



As we write this letter to you, Mr. President, we are attending to the needs of United Methodists in areas like the Democratic Republic of the Congo where there is much political unrest. We are praying and working not only for the protection of United Methodists but the protection of all who are vulnerable in this part of the world affected by extreme conflict and poverty. As you know, serious circumstances of this nature are happening in regions all over the world. We are deeply concerned that abruptly ending aid in regions of the world like the DRC could exacerbate suffering and create environments ripe for even greater and long-standing unrest, forced migration, and death.

In conclusion, we again commit to continuously pray for you and your Administration and to live the values of our faith in support of compassion and justice in the U.S. and in the world. We urge you, as the President of the United States, to consider that the call to assist others in crisis is a moral obligation of both national and spiritual dimensions.

We strongly ask you to rescind the Executive Order to suspend all U.S. foreign assistance programs for 90 days.

May the words of the Psalmist be upon all our hearts as we discern our living in these days:

"Give justice to the weak and the fatherless;

maintain the right of the afflicted and the destitute.

Rescue the weak and the needy;

deliver them from the hand of the wicked."

ASH WEDNESDAY WORSHIP SERVICES: MARCH 5TH • 11:00 AM & 7:00 PM


This year we will have two services; a morning Ash Wednesday service at 11am and an evening service at 7pm; both in our church sanctuary. We hope to see you there!

Dr. Yuki Schwartz to Preach at WLAUMC - Sunday, March 9th

On Sunday March 9th at our 9:30am English worship we will be blessed to have Rev. Dr. Yuki Schwartz preach the Sunday morning message. Dr. Schwartz is the Associate Dean for Academics and Assessment & Associate Professor of Constructive Theologies, Spirituality & Decolonial Studies at the Claremont School of Theology. Here is Dr. Schwartz bio from the CST faculty pages:

"Dr. Schwartz's areas of scholarship include deimperial/decolonial studies; Asian and Asian American theology; political theology; and critical race, gender, and sexuality studies. Their dissertation, titled "The Ends of Shame: Toward a Deimperial Political Theology of Messianism," investigated the development of shame theories under European and US imperialism, with an emphasis on the role of US Cold War politics in Asia in constructing political and theological understandings of shame and guilt. Dr. Schwartz is a longtime participant in the Pacific Asian North American Asian Women in Theology and Ministry (PANAAWTM) conference, and now serves as a member of the Board of Directors and as a mentor. They also are an ordained Christian minister withstanding in the United Church of Christ."

It is indeed such a blessing to have such close proximity to CST! The potential for gleaning the theological insight of such academic scholars from CST is truly an exciting opportunity to grow in faith. In addition, Dr. Schwartz is married to our own Rev. Clint Collins, our Choir Director who is also a staff member of CST! Let us extend a warm welcome to Rev. Dr. Yuki Schwartz.

EVENTS & NEWS SOCIAL AND ENVIRONMENTAL JUSTICE COMMITTEE

We are thrilled to celebrate such a successful effort by the Social Justice, Next Gen, & UWF collaboration on this year's **"Souper" Bowl Sunday for Wildfire Relief.**

The congregation enjoyed 10 soups (gallons of soup!), a mountain of bread rolls and mini bagels, yummy onigiri, and sweet treats! Thanks to all who contributed to the spread



and event, and to all who made donations. **We raised more than \$1,300 for fire relief** that will be donated to the fire relief efforts of World Central Kitchen, the organization founded by Chef Jose Andres that rallied local chefs and volunteers to feed first responders and displaced residents while the fires were still blazing, similar to what WCK has done in other disaster zones around the world.

We kicked off our first Social and Environmental Justice Ministry Team Meeting of the year on February 2nd with lunch and introductions by the 19 attendees. The Team includes seasoned and new volunteers, as well as representatives from the 580 Cafe/Wesley Foundation Serving UCLA (Deaconess Jeanne Roe Smith and grad student David Tanoko); Reconciling Ministries Network (RMN fellow and Claremont School of Theology seminarian Lynne Onishi); CLUE/Clergy & Laity United for Economic Justice (fellow Kiana); and Friends of the Ballona Wetlands (board member Steve Hirai). They shared about the concerns from the front lines of justice work in organizing, advocacy, and service. All bring expertise and connections that will keep us abreast of the needs in these areas and provide resources as we set priorities.

We look forward to continuing our work with Habitat for Humanity (including fire rebuilds) and neighbors at Kardia UMC, as well as focusing on the immediate needs regarding fire relief, migrant and immigration threats, LGBTQiA+ solidarity, and the many other challenges before us given the new federal Administration's massive disruptions to the safety nets so many rely on for their well-being.

Given the overwhelming number of issues before us, Jeri invited us to reflect, pray and discern: **"what is mine to do** – given my time, talents, gifts, and passions?" "What is God stirring within us individually, as a ministry team, and as a church congregation?"

HABITAT FOR HUMANITY

Reflecting back on the tragic fires of a month ago, many of us are looking to help and show our love for our neighbors. Habitat for Humanity had a zoom call on 2/6/25 that outlined some of their early thoughts on how to help

out. One thing mentioned by Erin Rank, CEO of Habitat LA was that after the Woolsey fires in 2018 Habitat LA helped 128 families who were affected. The LA and San Gabriel chapters are now teaming up as **Rebuild LA** to provide the most help possible. Donations can be sent to Rebuild Last the Habitat for Humanity LA website. Some of the greatest needs are items for the **Habitat for Humanity Restore**. Vouchers are being given to those who lost homes to help



with refurnishing rentals. Erin Rank has also been going to evacuation centers to speak with residents about their needs. So, if you are moving or downsizing please consider sending things to the Habitat Restore. When Lisa and I moved last year we sent much of our old furniture to them. Just remember, the journey is just beginning for these families. My prayer is that we have the strength to be with them for the long haul.


Congratulations to Lynne Onishi, 2025 Reconciling Ministries Network Fellow

"Momo-kuri(peach-nuts) three years, Kaki(persimmons) eight years."

As "Momo no sekku"(Peach festival/Girl's Day) approaches, I remember this phrase that we learned in Japan since we were little children. It reminds us that it takes time for fruits to bear and teaches us to "gaman."

In the Bible, we learn that "There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under heaven: a time to born and a time to die, a time to weep and a time to laugh..."(Ecclesiastes 3) A wise King Solomon wanted us to know God has a plan and time for all.

March 5th is Ash Wednesday. It is a time to remember the suffering of our Savior, the Lord Jesus. Jesus knew His disciples would face challenges and suffer in ministries like Him. They are like sheep trying to survive in a world that can be harsh, not accepting, and unforgiving. But Jesus doesn't just leave them there; He gave them tools for the journey: the wisdom of serpents and the innocence of doves. Fire and the Environment

While forest fires have been a part of life for millions of years, and forests have adapted to recover, the effect of cities and toxins have significantly impacted this natural process. I'm writing this on February 5th, and by the time this article goes to print, things may have already changed; however, there is some important information circling from TreePeople and Heal The Bay which I would like to relay:

What is the best thing we can do to help the burned areas?

Avoid visiting them. Visitors may unintentionally disturb the soil, hinder regrowth, or spread invasive seeds that could out-compete the native plants. When trails do open, please stay on the path at all times.

Will there be restoration efforts?

Yes! However, before any restoration can begin, it is critical to observe how the ecosystem is beginning to recover, so we can have a better understanding of what restoration approach may be necessary.

When will restoration begin?

Eight months to two years after the fire.

Can I help?

Yes! As soon as TreePeople can safely work on the project, announcements will be made. In the meantime, TreePeople has multiple projects working in burn scars. Please visit the Volunteer Calendar and select any event with the word "Restoration" in it.

How did the recent fires effect our Ocean?

With the ensuing rain, the hazardous material from the fire made its way to the ocean. This was in addition to the materials of "the first flush," where the trash and pollution that has accumulated on the surfaces in urban areas during the dry season, flows into the storm drains and waterways during the first rain of the wet season. At the time of writing this article, much of our beaches and oceans are toxic, and to be avoided.

What can I do to help the ocean?

Heal the Bay, Friends of the LA River, and The Ballona Wetlands are all hosting trash cleanups to get the trash out of the environment. Additionally, keep your own property as clean as possible. Do not hose down your property, as any chemicals and ash will run straight into the storm drains. If you are dealing with ash, gentle sweeping, followed by a wet mop or an HEPA-filtered vacuum is the best technique. Always protect yourself with gloves and a mask.
