I must admit that during my childhood I was unconcerned about the condition of the world. Such was the innocence and naiveté of my childhood. My high school years were the beginnings of becoming more acutely aware of how history has shaped and impacted my own life. I became more awakened to the realities of our nation and world and such injustices as prejudice and racism, sexism, and the importance of why the civil rights movement came about. Oh I had my personal experiences of prejudice and racism but I didn't understand it from a historical and institutional perspective. My awakenings were not so much learned through my public and private school education; rather, my awakening to

Theology, be ordained a United Methodist pastor, become a District Superintendent and a Bishop and now come back full circle to be the appointed President of the Claremont School of Theology. Though I give much credit and appreciation to Bishop Grant Hagiya for his early influence on my life, it is and was the church that shaped my understanding, my sensibilities and my concern for the world. Grant just happened to be deeply attuned to the truth of the mission and purpose of the church.

Though we value the church as a safe shelter and sanctuary from the ills and troubles of the world (a place of acceptance and welcome, a balm of comfort and consolation amidst the harshness of life;

included a list of everything troubling that I see happening in our nation, but that list kept getting longer and longer and so I am sparing you my lengthy troubling list that might only escalate your fears and concerns. I am quite sure if you make your own list we would have many of the same concerns.

All these troubles we see in our nation. and world are hard realities to face to be sure. How easy it is indeed to become overwhelmed, disillusioned, apathetic, fearful and hopeless. But friends, I hope you understand that it is because of the condition of the world today that the church is ever the more vital and necessary to help make things better. The church should not stand idly by in addressing the troubles of the world. Do not lose hope! The best way to avoid and remedy falling to despair is: get involved! However small or large our efforts may be, sometimes the smallest things we do can bring about the greatest changes.

NICHIGO MINISTRY

"Ishinomaki Mission Trip"

From July 24-August 2, I led the Misihonaki Mission trip. This year, we had a joint Young Adult team of six members from West Los Angeles UMC, Faith UMC & United Japanese Christian Church in Clovis, and an adult team of six members from Faith UMC. Because it's been four years since the outbreak of the pandemic, I was overwhelmed by the energy of the team members. Each day, we served in many areas and had very little rest time.

We left Los Angeles on Monday morning and arrived at Haneda on Tuesday. Due to a typhoon, we canceled our train ride and stayed overnight in Tokyo.

Early Wednesday morning, we left for Ishinomaki to serve a hula ministry at 1pm. Ishinomaki Hula Ministry, started by a missionary from Hawaii who died of cancer in Ishinomaki, continues to this day. There are 10 students. We learned that they are asked to dance at various events and are famous in the town. So Wonderful!

On Thursday, we had a dinner to encourage the Pastor & Missionary families who serve in Ishinomaki. Some churches have closed due to COVID-19, and many missionaries have left Ishinomaki and have returned to their home countries. The church attendance rate is super low these days; some days with only one or zero in attendance for some churches. We prepared a sukiyaki/gyoza dinner to encourage them. We were filled with gratitude when we saw their children eating and playing happily. We hope they keep up their good work for the Lord!

On Friday, we visited the Onagawa Government Housing village to do "Ochakko." The tea time started with prayer, then, a Bible story and crafts. I was surprised to see 10 participants who did not care to drink tea but instead, enjoyed crafts and paid so much attention to the Bible story

and prayer time together. The village people, whom we hadn't seen for four years, were so happy to see us that they didn't even bother to take the time to drink tea! The village leader said, "I thought we had been forgotten," and cried with joy.

In the evening, the Young Adult team had "Ochakko" at a "Hikikomori" NPO. We learned about a serious social issue in Japan. Many young people are not working and are staying home and playing games. We were able to be part of a new ministry that encourages young people, not to be afraid, but to work and actively involve themselves in the social life. On Saturday, the Young Adult team led a kodomo lunch program. We prepared yakiniku bento together to distribute. After lunch, we played games with the kodomo. During the kodomo program was going, the adult team was busy serving at a cafe concert. J-Symphonie, a flute and guitar duo, came from Tokyo and Australia to perform their Café concert ministry. The concert was very successful. The participants enjoyed Peet's Coffee so much that they kept asking for refills, and I wonder how many cups we made in total...

After the Sunday service, the Young Adult team led a children's English Bible program. Twenty-one children participated and enjoyed Praise songs, a Bible story, a craft, and games.

Even when unexpected things like typhoons and illnesses occurred, the teams were able to adapt and help each other. I can only thank the Lord!

WHY IS PLASTIC SO BAD ANYWAY?

Starting at the very beginning, plastic was invented in 1907. As I understand it, its popularity really grew in the 1930s with the invention of polyethylene, when plastics usage expanded from less common things like radar insulation, to Tupperware, shopping bags, and nylon stockings. The Guardian states that since 1950, more than 8 billion tons of plastic have been produced.

The properties of plastic make it highly desirable: cheap but durable, strong but light-weight and flexible. It can be molded into practically any shape. Unfortunately these characteristics come with a high cost. Besides the fact that plastic is made from nonrenewable resources and its creation produces a multitude of greenhouse gases, its most condemning attribute is simply that it's hard to get rid of. Of that 8+ billion tons of plastic that has been produced since 1950, likely 79% has since accumulated in landfills and the environment. Plastic can take anywhere from 10 to 500 years to break down, and as we already know, it causes major problems to wildlife, plant life, and oceans as it sits around. Additionally when plastic does "break down" it does not biodegrade, but only breaks into smaller and smaller pieces, called microplastics. These microplastics have been found everywhere, from fish blood streams to human breast milk.

While we all are working to cut down on our plastic and any singleuse item consumption, it was very heartening to hear the news that we are not alone. The intergovernmental Negotiating Committee on Plastic Pollution had its fourth meeting (out of five) this last April in Ottawa to discuss a global treaty on plastic pollution. While there were still sharp disagreements about whether to limit plastic production globally, the focus of the meeting has finally moved on from discussing generic ideas to the actual text of

the treaty. The final session will meet later this

vear in South Korea.
